In the Classroom

On Tuesday 7 February, I arrived at Dedworth Middle School for their *RE Drop Down* day. The topic was *Forgiveness* and gave me an



opportunity to share in a Q & A with five classes; to unpack Luke 23:34 (for me, the most powerful sentence in the Bible!) and to tell them about the miracle of Easter. I had conversations with a number of staff and lunch with some year 7's, but on this occasion there was no time for Table-Tennis! However, the week before at Windsor Boys', I was given the same opportunities, using the same three items I later used at Dedworth – laptop, Bible and Table-Tennis bat. I enjoyed playing 'winner stays on' with some of the lads before they came into the hall for registration and assembly, so thank you Jesus for such opportunities!

Wednesday 22 March was one of those memorable days. It started before an assembly when I chatted with a parent who told me he was an ex-pupil at Furze Platt Senior, the very place where my day finished hours later at an

called Building Bridges event (more information available on request). Sandwiched between the two, the unexpected occurred when I popped into Burnham Grammar to chat with students and staff. It happened to be their delayed World Book Day and one year 11 was wearing the most brilliant top - an Arsenal football shirt! If I'd known it was a non-uniform day I would have worn mine! (By the time you read this, the Premiership could be finished... Have Arsenal won it? There IS more to life than football!) Just before leaving I popped in to see Rachel, one of the RE staff with whom I shared the last lesson of the day, as her Year 11 exam group revised Christian practices, worship, Easter and more. She then asked if I'd like to stay and answer questions from the pupils, which proved to be just BRILLIANT. The hour flew by and I loved it. Towards the end of the session, one lad asked for the Zach Rap, so we found the backing track on YouTube and off we went! As I left, I thought: Praise God for Hanging Around Ministry and the chance to assist and share, amongst other things, the Easter miracle with these 16-yearold students.

Eden Girls', Eton College and others...

A taste of the great variety which comes with being a local schools worker: on one morning I was at Eden Girls, where at the start of a lesson there was a prayer in Arabic which was then translated into English. Eden Girls' is an Islamic school which I have been visiting for many years, to share about Jesus and the Christian faith. Later I was invited into Eton College to talk about Jesus with a few hundred teenage lads. Such a contrast, and what a privilege, for which I'm very grateful.

Easter Cracked

Twenty years ago, Sarah Smart wrote the *Easter Rap*, which complements the *Check It Out!* Rap written by Anita Fielder. You can see and hear this rap on the link in the covering email.

During the pandemic, I was on a regular local walk, when across the road someone called to me. He didn't say 'hi'. The first thing he said was, 'One Man!' This threw me! 'One Man' is the first line of the chorus of the *Easter Rap*. So, I crossed the road and we chatted. His name is Neil, and he could remember coming along to *Easter Cracked* around thirteen years earlier, where this rap was performed. Praise God! I call it 'delayed reaction,' and it proves that nothing done for our God is wasted.

We had some very positive feedback from staff pupils following the Easter and Focus presentations which took place in schools during March. Ten local churches were also involved in serving well over forty schools. I personally had the chance to be involved with a greater number of schools than ever before - in fact, I ran out of pupil booklets. It was just as well that I had a 'plan B' to order more books, so that all the schools who wanted the presentation were able to have them to use during the session.

On a similar note, after a lunchtime visit to Langley Grammar, I popped into Langley Free Church to find Marish enjoying *Easter Cracked*. I was just so encouraged to see this Langley church continuing its long-standing relationship with one of its local schools.

Ongoing responsibilities

The trustees continue to investigate ways to expand the role of CCiS in primary schools. Although we received several applications when we advertised for a Primary Schools Development Worker, we decided not to proceed until we had given more thought to the requirements of this post. To this end, we have sought and received input from other local Christian schools work organisations, which has proved to be very helpful and given us insights which are allowing us to reevaluate our approach.

Since its inception, we have been administering the *Jem Sewell Fund*, which helps children and young people from schools in Slough, Windsor and Maidenhead to attend a Scripture Union Holiday. For more details, see Wayne's news above. We ask donors to indicate clearly that they are contributing to this particular fund, so that we can specifically allocate donations for that purpose. Cheques should be made payable to *Christian Connections in Schools*, with *Jem Sewell Fund* written on the back. Address and BACS details can be found at the end of this newsletter.

We have also been working on policies and IT backup to enable CCiS to continue to run safely and securely, and have been assisting with the arrangements for *Illuminate*.
